

Georgia initiated 4 new criminal human trafficking cases in 2018, ranking it 11th in the nation for number of new cases.



ACTIVE CRIMINAL CASES


Georgia had 15 criminal human trafficking cases active in 2018, ranking it 14th in the nation for number of active cases.



Georgia convicted 12 defendants in human trafficking cases in 2018, ranking it 9th in the nation for number of defendants convicted.

RESTITUTION



Georgia ordered **3** defendants to pay restitution in 2018, ranking it 12th in the nation for restitution orders.


NEW CRIMINAL LABOR TRAFFICKING CASES

Georgia was 1 out of 49 states and territories that failed to initiate a criminal labor trafficking prosecution in 2018.

Nationally, the most common type of exploited labor in labor trafficking cases active in 2018 was domestic work. Over half of the active labor trafficking cases involved a defendant using threats of deportation to coerce labor or services.

LIMITATIONS: The Report's findings are not a prevalence estimate of human trafficking in the United States but instead serve as an objective summary of what the federal system has done to address trafficking. The Report does not capture data from state prosecutions, state civil suits, or unreported human trafficking cases.
