






NEW CRIMINAL CASES BY DISTRICT

NEW CRIMINAL CASES

Louisiana initiated 3 new criminal human trafficking cases in 2018, ranking it 19th in the nation for number of new cases.



ACTIVE CRIMINAL CASES


Louisiana had 8 criminal human trafficking cases active in 2018, ranking it 23rd in the nation for number of active cases.



CONVICTIONS

Louisiana convicted 3 defendants in human trafficking cases in 2018, ranking it 28th in the nation for number of defendants convicted.

Louisiana ordered 1 defendant to pay restitution in 2018, ranking it 23rd in the nation for restitution orders.

NEW CRIMINAL LABOR TRAFFICKING CASES

In 2018, federal courts in Louisiana filed criminal charges against 4 defendants in 1 labor trafficking case. Louisiana was 1 of only 7 states that initiated a criminal labor trafficking prosecution in 2018.




NEW CRIMINAL HUMAN TRAFFICKING DEFENDANTS



CIVIL CASES

Plaintiffs filed only 31 new civil human trafficking suits in federal courts nationwide. Of the new civil cases, 87.1% were labor trafficking cases and 12.9% were sex trafficking cases.
