

NEW CRIMINAL CASES:

ACTIVE CRIMINAL CASES:

Federal courts in California handled 57 active criminal human trafficking cases in 2019, ranking it 2nd in the nation for number of active cases.

National active criminal cases: 606

2nd 88% 12%

CONVICTIONS:

Federal courts in California convicted 19 defendants in human trafficking cases in 2019, ranking it 4th in the nation for number of defendants convicted.

National convictions: 339

RESTITUTION:

Federal judges in California ordered 5 out of 12 convicted defendants* to pay restitution in 2019, ranking it 15th in the nation for percentage of defendants ordered to pay restitution.

National restitution percentage: 33%

*7 of the convicted defendants were in cases where the government did not name a trafficking victim in the charging instrument. These defendants have been excluded for purposes of restitution calculations.




