

### **HOW DOES YOUR STATE STACK UP?**



#### **NEW CRIMINAL CASES:**

Federal prosecutors in Ohio charged **4 new criminal human trafficking cases** in 2019, ranking it 9th in the nation for number of new cases.

National new criminal cases: 145



### **ACTIVE CRIMINAL CASES:**

Federal courts in Ohio handled **12** active criminal human trafficking cases in 2019, ranking it 14th in the nation for number of active cases.

National active criminal cases: 606



### **CONVICTIONS:**

Federal courts in Ohio convicted **8 defendants in human trafficking cases** in 2019, ranking it 11th in the nation for number of defendants convicted.

National convictions: 339



### **RESTITUTION:**

Federal judges in Ohio ordered 2 out of 7 convicted defendants\* to pay restitution in 2019, ranking it 20th in the nation for percentage of defendants ordered to pay restitution.

National restitution percentage: 33%

\*1 of the convicted defendants was in a case where the government did not name a trafficking victim in the charging instrument. This defendant has been excluded for purposes of restitution calculations.










### **ACTIVE DEFENDANTS IN CRIMINAL HUMAN TRAFFICKING CASES**
